CLUB	ADVISOR	DESCRIPTION
ACADEMIC DECATHLON	Mr. Cann Mr. Nilsen	The United States Academic Decathlon® is a ten-event scholastic competition for teams of high school students. Students hone their academic, speech, and interview skills via regional competitions for individual and team recognition.
ANIMAL RIGHTS CLUB	Ms. Jerome	The Animal Rights Club is an exciting and beneficial as it raises money for animal care and promotes awareness about animal cruelty. The club provides students with information regarding animal rights and allows them to voice opinions.
ART CLUB	Ms. DiGiacopo	Art Club provides students with an open studio environment where students can develop their own art projects with the teacher's guidance. Group projects based on basic art skills are also offered.
ASIAN CULTURE CLUB	Ms. Spathis	The Asian Culture Club offers an opportunity for students to explore the many different cultures that span the continent of Asia. This student-led club offers different members the opportunity to teach the group about an aspect of their own Asian culture or a culture that interests them within Asia. Music, cuisine, art, and literature are some of the areas that the club will explore. The club invites students of all nationalities to attend club meetings to learn more about Asian cultures.

Students will also benefit from volunteering as they learn more about students with special needs and gain understanding and ability to interact with them.
CHEMISTRY OLYMPICS	Mr. Nilsen	Students participate in a variety of chemistry events, such as performing research, delivering chemical demonstrations, and solving problems using advanced laboratory techniques. The team practices regularly in preparation for the New Jersey Chemistry Olympics competition, in which schools from around the state compete against each other at the NJIT campus.
CHINESE HONOR SOCIETY	Mr. O'Neill	<i>The <b>National Chinese Honor Society (NCHS)</b> was established in November, 1993 to recognize those accomplished high school students who study Chinese as a world language. The National Chinese Honor Society is a scholastic organization that promotes and recognizes students with good citizenship, leadership, and deeds of community service. Membership is open to any senior who has completed or is currently enrolled in the highest level of Chinese offered within Pascack Valley Regional HS District (either Chinese IV/V or Chinese IV/V Honors). In order to remain in the NCHS, members must maintain a cumulative average of an A-. Seniors are inducted every Fall. Induction into the NCHS is an academic honor that can be noted in any college or scholarship application. Inductees are expected to participate in peer tutoring as well as other community-oriented activities. The club also organizes trips to cultural events.</i>

In addition, the club attempts to go on one or two building and/or site cleanup trips during the school year including one in fall and another in spring. Habitat for Humanity is open to the entire student body, however only members 16 year of age and older are allowed to attend building trips. Underclassmen are encouraged to join the club and help with the various fundraisers sponsored throughout the year.

LITERARY MAGAZINE	Mr. Morone	<p>Outside/In, PV's Literature and Art magazine, works throughout the year to solicit, evaluate, and present creative student work through a variety of formats: The traditional annual print magazine, delivered every fall; the new digital magazine <a href="http://www.outsideinmag.com">www.outsideinmag.com</a>, which provides text, video, music, and graphic art on a rolling basis; and through Lit Out Loud (LOL), the annual "coffee-house" style event, which provides an opportunity to see and hear these artistic creations in a live setting. Outside/In encourages all PV students to submit their creative writing, photography, visual art, original music, and films to the digital and print magazine of the school.</p>
MARCHING BAND DIRECTOR	Mr. Zajac	<p>The Marching Band is open to any students who would like to play an exciting variety of popular musical styles on a brass, woodwind or percussion instrument. The Marching Band performs at all varsity football games, band festivals and parades. Experience is preferred but not required. Students interested in becoming members of the Flag Squad are also encouraged to join the Marching Band. The PVHS Marching Band meets both as a class and after school. After school practices are during the fall football season only in the first marking period. For the remainder of the year, the students in the Marching Band class perform as the Wind Ensemble at all the evening Band Concerts.</p>
MODEL U.N.	Mr. Quinlan	<p>Model UN provides students the opportunity to research, analyze and better understand world issues. Students participate in competitions in which they replicate the United Nations and represent various nations on issues ranging from nuclear proliferation to immigration to international trade.</p>

<p>NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY</p>	<p>Ms. Santo</p>	<p>The National Honor Society is a group of model junior and senior students who are involved in community service, fundraising and academic services directed towards the betterment of the PV community as well as surrounding towns. Juniors who have a 3.7+ GPA in the middle of their junior year will be invited to apply. NHS students provide academic support for their classmates through drop-in tutoring sessions during the Pascack Period as well as during private sessions as well. In October, NHS works in collaboration with other groups to run the Pink and Denim fundraiser. NHS collects, shops and creates full Thanksgiving meals to approximately 12 families in the immediate community each November. Students raise money through various holiday candy gram sales to donate to the Dr. Sapienza Scholarship Fund and help fund the Stop Hunger Now Food Packaging Event which is done in collaboration with the Hills NHS each March. NHS students are expected to act as a model for the underclassmen in the four pillars of the group: character, leadership, scholarship and service.</p>
<p>NEWSPAPER</p>	<p>Mr. Rawson</p>	<p>The Smoke Signal is Pascack Valley’s student-run newspaper. The publication’s primary focus is its website, <a href="http://pvmokesignal.com">pvmokesignal.com</a>, which is committed to providing new and timely news, sports, arts, and other relevant content every single day and in a variety of different media, including written articles, video content, blogs, podcasts, infographics, and the like. The Smoke Signal also publishes occasional (usually themed) print issues.</p>
<p>ONE-SPIRIT</p>	<p>Ms. Jerome Ms. Mathias</p>	<p>The mission of One Spirit is to promote and educate Native American history, culture, and current social issues. The club prepares for an annual visit to the reservations of South Dakota including the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe and the Pine Ridge Reservations. Students will learn what it means to be Native American in the 21st century, highlighting not only the struggles of the</p>

		<p>reservation system but also the beauty of Native American culture, philosophy, and values. Throughout the year, students will study the history of America's indigenous peoples and the challenges they faced with broken treaties and westward expansion.</p>
OUR MINDS MATTER	Ms. Rossig Dr. Myers	<p><b>Our minds matter</b> is a club that seeks to set the tone around mental health in our school community. We strive to encourage students to seek help for themselves and friends. We promote social connectedness and the development of healthy habits and coping skills through a variety of projects and activities.</p>
PEER LEADER PROGRAM	Ms. McSpirit Ms. Marchiano Dr. Andrisani	<p>Juniors and seniors work together to discuss various issues that affect teens, and adults, today. Groups then work with freshmen to help acclimate the students to high school and to school's culture. The Peer Leaders act as advocates for the underclassmen and as moderators among the students. Peer Program advisors work a guide for the students, helping plan activities and workshops.</p>
PUBLIC RELATIONS	Ms. Doherty	<p>The public relations advisor Identifies news opportunities, writes and edits press releases, and obtains related photos and confirms photo authorization. Other responsibilities include distributing news to local and county newspapers and monitoring media coverage and collecting media clips for posting on the "news" bulletin board.</p>
P.V. NETWORK	Ms. McSpirit Ms. Errity	<p>This is a community based club that raises funds and awareness for specific organizations within the local community. Some of these organizations are Center for Hope and Safety; a shelter for battered women and their children, Spoil Me Pink a local charity that provides breast cancer survivors a day of beauty. In addition our club members run an annual toy drive for the shelter during the Holiday Season and create baskets of beauty and love for the women on Mother's Day.</p>



SCIENCE LEAGUE	Mr. Nilsen	Students are invited to represent PV at regional competitions related to their knowledge of Biology, Chemistry, and Physics at the advanced level. Students are eligible for scholarships and individual awards.
SCIENCE NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY	Ms. Reese	Seniors are invited to the society based on national charter rules. The goal of science national honors society is to investigate or analyze a section of the school that the students feel needs improvement or refining. This year the students are creating an experiment to determine the wait time on the lunch lines at different parts of the lunch period. They will compile their results and make suggestions for improvement of wait time if necessary.
SCIENCE RESEARCH CLUB	Dr. Healey	The Science Research Club is a club where students work on authentic research projects of their own design and learn modern laboratory techniques. In the first year of membership, students also work on a project in collaboration with Rutgers University in the Waksman Student Scholar Program where they use modern molecular genetic techniques and bioinformatic software for data analysis. Enrollment in the Research in Molecular Genetics Class is required for membership into the club.
S.E.A.A. (Students for Environment Advocacy & Action)	Ms. Lindstrom Ms. Piccoline	The Environmental Club focuses on raising awareness of important environmental issues that impact the daily lives at PV. The club will host speakers, volunteer to do garden cleanups, take care of the courtyard pond, and join together the student body in changing some unhealthy habits.
SENIOR PROJECTS COORDINATOR	TBD	This program affords interested seniors the opportunity to opt out of a class during second semester in order to pursue an independent study project under the tutelage of a faculty mentor chosen by the student. The projects culminate in a research paper, journal and 20-minute oral presentation to a panel of faculty volunteers who award the final grades to the projects. Past

<p>SPANISH HONOR SOCIETY</p>	<p>Ms. Farrell</p>	<p>(Esmeralda Santiago Chapter) This is a national honor society for seniors who are currently enrolled in, and have taken Spanish all four years of high school, while maintaining a 3.7 GPA in the language. Students participate in community service and fundraising activities, which help promote the Spanish language and culture.</p>
<p>STUDENT GOVERNMENT</p>	<p>Mr. Buchanan</p>	<p>Student Government enables students to be leaders on the class, as well as school level. Through elected and appointed positions, students can get involved with helping shape the building climate and goals. Class Council members raise money and awareness for their Class Causes, in addition to hosting fundraisers to help offset class expenses, including the Junior and Senior Proms. Class Council members work directly for their grade.
